Our goal is to create lasting pathways that improve the overall quality of health, work, education, and justice for boys and men of color to achieve their greatest hopes and dreams. Collectively we believe that our investment will result in the Northstar goal of boys and men of color in California reaching 300% of the federal poverty level rate.

As we pivot and recover from a historic pandemic, California is positioned as one of the leading global economies with some of the greatest inequities. There is a great urgency for us to leverage the billions of dollars circulating to address today's pressing challenges, such as loneliness and increased mental health stress, interruptions to academic and professional growth because of COVID and the digital divide, racist school discipline policies, disproportionate criminalization and violence by police, mounting student loan debt, and a broken immigration system.

As CFBMoC deepens our focus on building power and pathways to economic freedom, we look forward to forging new strategies and collaborations that focus on addressing these areas holistically. Life Course Framework

CFBMoC uses the Life Course Framework, developed by Arnold Chandler, the co-founder of Forward Change Consulting, to guide our work and investments. This framework effectively organizes a variety of complex factors that shape the outcomes we care about for boys and men of color, and how the issues they face intersect. CFBMoC funds and engages in initiatives that impact either the barriers or "off-ramps" that boys and men of color face or improve the "on-ramps" on their life journey.



Early Childhood (0-6)

 Prepare children for school



Middle Childhood (7-11)

- Provide resources to increase proficiency in math and reading by third grade
- Develop socio-emotional skills and behavior by the fifth grade



Adolescence (12-18)

- Improve middle school grades to reduce course failures and ultimately increase high school graduation
- Reduce juvenile arrests and convictions



Emerging Adulthood (19-25)

- Increase college graduation
- Reduce felony arrests, convictions, incarceration and recidivism
- Stable, full-time employment greater than 300% federal poverty rate

Our Strategy

CFBMoC uses a three-pronged strategy consisting of a regional focus, policy and strategic communications to effect change.

Regional Focus

The network is currently active across California with a specific focus on three main regions: Bay Area-Northern California, Southern California and Sacramento-San Joaquin Valley. Through our place-based Regional Action Committees (RACs), CFBMoC members are actively working on investing in direct service programming, and policy and advocacy around each region's issue area, and coalition-based work. CFBMoC plans to expand its work in more counties throughout San Joaquin Valley and additional regions such as the **Central** Coast, San Diego and Imperial Valley, and the Inland Empire.



Bay Area-Northern California: Investing in youth justice and the inclusion of boys and men of color in the thriving economy.

 An estimated 9,000+ young men of color have been connected to employment opportunities in the Bay Area through our support for economic mobility programming. We are also redeveloping our leadership table to focus on strategies to address youth justice in the region.

Southern California: Reshaping Los Angeles County's approach to youth development and ensuring that all young people have a fair chance to thrive.

With our partners and community leaders, we launched a statewide campaign to #CloseDJJtheRightWay that resulted in Governor Newsom signing SB 823, a historic bill that will lead to the closure of California's Division of Juvenile Justice and investment in alternatives to incarceration. Thanks to the advocacy and organizing efforts by our RAC members and California Alliance for Youth and Community Justice, LA County opened a new Department of Youth Development.

Sacramento-San Joaquin Valley: Access to and the completion of post-secondary education opportunities for boys and men of color.

 The RAC awarded \$300,000 to 12 organizations focused on educational equity to support greater access to and completion of post-secondary education for boys and men of color.

We hold ongoing policy convenings to brief members and partners on the latest news, campaigns and bills that are driving quality jobs, education equity, youth leadership and justice, economic mobility, community safety, justice, and healing.

Learning


